37. **RATIONALE** FOR ACTION REQUESTED

Queer Studies in an Interdisciplinary Approach is a weekly academic lecture and discussion series with guest scholars and community activists from various disciplines examining a variety of topics related to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer studies. Bringing in scholars, activists and educators with backgrounds in literature, history, sociology, anthropology, philosophy, psychology, law, natural sciences, as well as other areas, this course offers a broad sampling of the existing research in the field of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer studies. The course provides an overview of the broad field and the work of queer* scholars. Students are required to attend a weekly lecture (1.5 hrs.), a weekly discussion (1 hr.), and read related articles. Writing assignments include short (1-3-page) response papers for each presented talk; a 5-page essay, a final 10-page research paper and a final exam.

*Identifying a scholar as a "queer scholar" is not necessarily defining the scholar's own sexual orientation or gender identity. Rather, it is referring to their scholarship.

The earlier version of this course was an experiential INTD 3995 level course based on a letter grade system. Course work assignments included weekly response papers, weekly discussions, and a final research paper.

The new special topic course proposal will utilize the S/U grading system. The course work

assignments will be significantly expanded. The course work assignments include weekly response papers, weekly discussions, a 5-page essay, a 10-page research paper and a final exam.

As a new special topics course, the interdisciplinary approach involves both scholars and activists from various academic disciplines and fields. The course will offer a unique group of speakers each semester, addressing Queer topics from different perspectives. Thus, the weekly reading materials will include a variety of academic articles; book chapters; government documents and organizational reports provided by the speakers.

In addition, due to the nature of the course, other instructors utilize the speakers to fulfill educational goals. This proposal will strengthen the collaboration with the faculty who teach related topics.
