The existing dairy cattle MS&P course (SAAS 363) can be taken twice for credit. Frequently students enrolled for their second round are outnumbered by first-timers, a situation which often leads to experienced students being bored while the newbies are exposed to very basic activities. Offering a class for 363 veterans only would allow novel activities and enhance the students' learning experiences.

SAAS 364 - Management Skills and Practices - Dairy Cattle II

Course Syllabus (loosely interpreted):

This is an S/U experience-based course (no lectures) that gives Ratcliffe Hicks students the opportunity to acquire hands-on experience in activities commonly associated with dairy cattle management. The specific activities in which they engage are somewhat driven by management factors, so a traditional time-line syllabus would likely be inaccurate. The proposed catalog copy comes as close possible. As an FYI, however, the types of activities in which student engage are milking cows, administering estrus synchronization programs, calf management activities such as ear tagging, milk replacer preparation and vaccine administration, managing housing conditions, moving cattle (via trailer), etc. Many of our students do not have an agricultural background (even RH students!) and this course (in conjunction with SAAS 363) gives students an opportunity to increase their experiences with dairy cattle, become comfortable around cows, and begin to develop common management skills.
